





Highlights/ Changes

Funding for Infrastructure Replacement

Budget includes approved Bylaw increases to Utility rates for debt repayments needed for the BIG Project.

Investments made today will enable our future utility operating funds to go towards planned capital replacements, instead of continuously exhausting budgets on emergency repairs

Budget Deficit

General Operating Fund — New Taxation Need

• Staff Contractual and Benefits Increases - \$296,000

• General Expense & Debt Increase - \$189,000

• RCMP Contract Increase - \$364,000

Transit Contract Increase - \$85,000

• Community Enhancement Grants - \$26,000

• Total Deficit \$960,000





PLEASE NOTE

The City also collects taxes on behalf of other taxation authorities such as the School Tax, Regional Hospital District, North Coast Regional District, BC Assessment & Municipal Finance Authority.

In 2025, approximately 65% of your tax bill was made up of taxes collected by the municipality, with the rest going to other entities


